The Chew Kee Museum, located in California's gold country, is a time capsule of Chinese immigrant culture. Constructed in 1855, the structure was continuously occupied by Chinese residents until 1965. Established as a medicinal herb shop, it also served as a home and community gathering place. The structure is a California Landmark and on the National Register of Historic Places.

Cal Fire 4291 Defensible Space Volunteer Training

Wednesday, March 31 | 12 PM to (approximately 2 hours)

The Volunteers in Prevention (VIP) program utilizes citizens in non-salaried positions to reduce man-caused fires. Volunteers are trained to make preliminary wildland homeowner property inspections for fire safety as required by Public Resources Code 4291, and to discuss with homeowners ways to make their homes fire safe. These one-on-one contacts are an increasingly important education tool as the population in California's wildlands continues to grow.

Burn Pile Guidelines

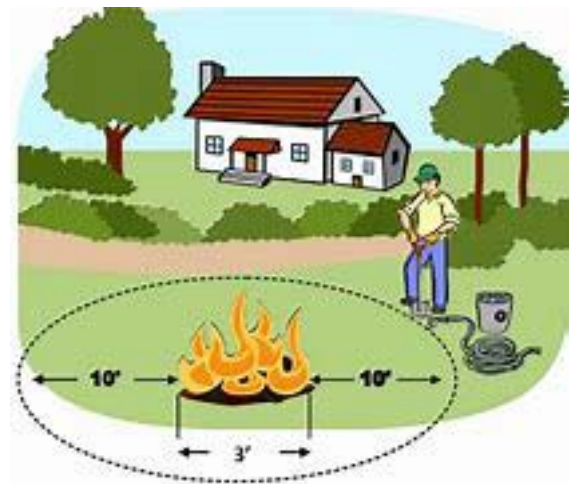
Ensure that you are doing your burn pile correctly and safely to avoid any unwanted emergencies.

- Landscape debris piles must be in small 4 feet by 4 feet piles.
- Choose a safe burning site away from powerlines, overhanging limbs, buildings, vehicles, and equipment. You'll need at least three times the height of the pile of vertical clearance.
- Clear all flammable material and vegetation within 10 feet of the outer edge of pile.
- Keep a water supply and shovel close to the burning site.
- A responsible adult is required by law to be in attendance until the fire is out.
- No burning shall be undertaken unless weather conditions (particularly wind) are such that burning can be considered safe.

Get Your Burn Permit

You must have an Amador Air District Large Pile **Burn Permit** when burning any outdoor fire larger than 4 feet by 4 feet. This burn permit is only available from the Air District. You can go to 810 Court Street in Jackson or call the office at 209/257-0112 and request that an application be mailed to you. Visit [burn permit](#).
